Yizkor Elohim (Memorial)

The *Yizkor* service asks God to remember those we mourn and to grant them proper rest. The word *Yizkor* is Hebrew for "remember." For many, the service represents a kind of pact; by remembering our parents, we ensure that we will, in turn, be remembered by those who follow us. Some believe that reciting *Yizkor* can help promote a peaceful rest for that departed soul. Also, we remember loved ones by the acts of loving-kindness we perform in this world.

We invite everybody to celebrate the New Year at a festive "Oneg" immediately following the Rosh Hashanah evening service. On Yom Kippur, following the Neilah (Concluding Service), please join us for our annual Break Fast. The Break Fast is open to everyone, but you must make a reservation before the holiday by emailing jbyrnes.templemicah@gmail.com by September 22nd. Your monetary donation, as well as any help for set-up and clean-up, will be greatly appreciated!

Child Care is available at the church during the **daytime Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur Services** for children up to age 8; cribs are available for infants. Children are welcome to attend the morning services, but are *highly encouraged* to attend the Family Services, Tashlich, Neilah, and Break Fast.
